Labor Day 2017

The singer-songwriter and Long Island, New York native, Billy Joel is as busy as ever, hosting concerts at most of the Major League baseball parks this summer, as well as serving as the resident artist at Madison Square Garden. Interestingly, he has not produced an album since 1993 – *River of Dreams*. The last song on his final album is a piece that is rarely heard, and maybe one of his best. In “Famous Last Words,” the Piano Man writes:

Sitting here in Avalon, looking at the pouring rain.
Summertime has come and gone, and everybody's
home again.

The song continues:

There's comfort in my coffee cup and apples in the
early Fall.

They're pulling all the moorings up and gathering in the

They swept away all the streamers after the Labor Day
parade.

Nothing left for a dream now, only one final serenade.

Pretty much everyone loves summer and for the most part, there is always a hint of sadness and even trepidation as Labor Day rolls around. School is starting up. Work goes back into full swing. And even though Americans love to work, and summer is becoming no different from any other time of the year when it comes to tasks, it seems that the summer gives us the opportunity to enjoy a little relaxation with the minimum amount of guilt when we opt to put our feet up and rest. The end of summer is inevitable, but this little song by Billy Joel makes Labor Day almost romantic and palatable.

As we celebrate Labor Day weekend, we are reminded that in our work, we praise God through our talents and perseverance. In the Book of Genesis, even before the Fall, Adam and Eve labored in the Garden of Eden. But their tasks were joy-filled and just. It was after the disobedience of our first parents that they were banished to the east of Eden and burdened with labor that was difficult and tedious. Thus work is not a consequence of original sin, but as a result of the Fall, history has been replete with unjust and harsh labor, as well of the unfortunate situations that many face through unemployment or under-employment.

In his 1946 work, *All You Who Labor: Work and the Sanctification of Daily Life* by the late Primate of Poland, formidable foe of Soviet atheistic communism, and mentor to the future Saint John Paul II, Stefan Cardinal Wyszyński writes of the divine partnership of work and prayer:

Prayer withdraws us from the world, from all that is temporal
Around us, from all external life, and causes us to become
Entirely immersed in God. Work, on the other hand draws us
toward creation. In work, the world of created things demands
our full attention; it insists on our being fully taken up with it.

Prayer and work bring us closer to God.

As the summer season comes to a close, we thank our Lord for the blessings of work. We also bring to prayer all our brothers and sisters who are suffering the effects of unemployment or underemployment. Work is good. Work is essential. But in the words of Blessed Paul VI, we are ultimately defined by who we are, and not what we do.

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September 11, 2001 – Fifteen Years Later

What were we doing on December 7, 1941? Where were we when our neighbor president Franklin Roosevelt died? When John F. Kennedy, Martin Luther King, Jr., and Robert F. Kennedy were struck down by assassins bullets? The Challenger explosion? What was it like when we began our day on that sunny, late summer September morning when three simultaneous terrorist attacks on American soil changed the world?

The attacks of September 11, 2001, oddly feels like they happened yesterday but at the same time seemed as though it was years ago. Interesting, there are now young people who were not yet born or those who have no recollection of those terrible events. There was a heart-rending story in the Sunday, September 4, 2016 New York Post about two young people about to enter high school who were born after their fathers died in the September 11 attacks. Although they never knew their fathers, these young people have a special relationship with the fathers whom they have never met. These young people will never forget their fathers. But for this new generation who never experienced that horrible day, how do we keep the memory alive?

A little town in Northern New Jersey, some twenty miles west of New York City has developed a poignant way to keep the story of that horrible day from being relegated by those born after September 11 to the shelves of ancient history. Last year, a local businessman in Cedar Grove, Essex County, New Jersey funded a project for the grounds of the local high school, where two thousand, nine hundred and ninety-six 1' x 18' flags were to be symmetrically (and mathematically) placed on the front lawn of the local high school. These flags, would represent every soul who perished at the World Trade Center, the Pentagon in Arlington, Virginia, and Shanksville, Pennsylvania. Although most of the flags were American, there were other national flags interspersed throughout the memorial...from India to Germany, Great Britain to China, Bermuda to Canada, and every country in between. The finished product a moving array indeed! The entrepreneur who funded this memorial came to realize that the members of the class entering that high school last year were born in 2001 and hoped that such a tribute would instill concern and remembrance for the victims and their families. Now the incoming first year class were born in 2001. All the more reason to repeat this exhibit this year.

All of us in some way were affected, and continue to feel the sorrow of September 11, 2001. We as Catholics are buttressed by prayer, Holy Mass, and the great reverence for our dearly departed and the hope of the Resurrection of the Body. As we gather for Holy Mass this Sunday, may we commend to prayer our brothers and sisters who perished this day, fifteen years ago. And please join us for a special memorial service at the flagpole immediately after the 11:30am Mass.

Eternal rest grant unto them O Lord. And let perpetual light shine upon them.

We chose to supply them with beverages of their choice on an unlimited basis with no purchase necessary, and we were honored to be able to help them enjoy a day at the fair without having to be concerned with their budget. We are especially grateful for the many volunteers who came out to help us with this fundraiser. Some of you were new to this experience, or had not done it in many years, but you did a great job and we hope you join us again next year. (We even had one volunteer from Philadelphia who was visiting a parish family, and insisted on coming along with them to work their shift. She did a great job working the counter.) Our teenage volunteers were incredible! A number of them did double shift on some days and single shifts on others, and they stayed and worked diligently each time. Our "regular" crew who work every day each year were fantastic as always. It's not the ideal way to spend a week of your vacation time, but they do it every year. They involve their spouses, children and grandchildren and we could never manage without them. So, thanks to those from the parish, the community, and the Knights of Columbus for all your help. And a special thank you to Fr. Morris who, even with a very busy end of summer schedule, managed to fit a daily visit to our booth. Thanks too, to our parish office staff for all they do to help us before, during and after the fair. May God bless you all for the gift of your time and talents.
